



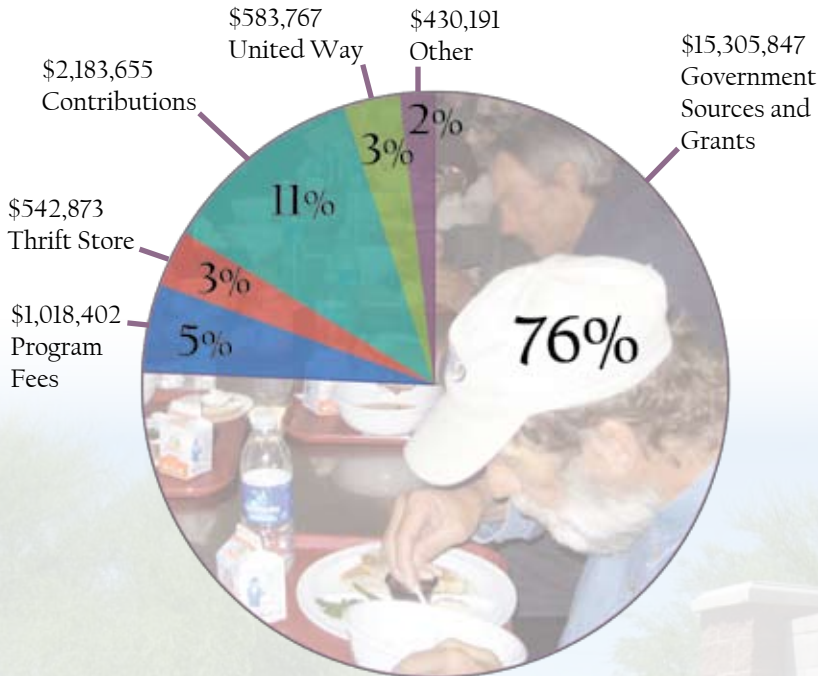

Adoption Services placed 40 children in loving adoptive homes.

Crossroads Transitional Living for Senior Men aided over 80 men, age 55 and older, monthly with housing meals and support, helping them on their path to independent permanent housing.

Employment Services Center offered job assessments, employment and training opportunities to men and women.

Over 100 Foster Grandparents provided 77,823 hours of service to more than 600 at-risk students in 46 area schools.

Immigration Services assisted and counseled 2,200 clients about their Immigration rights and secured citizenship for 15 individuals.

St. Vincent Plaza Lied Dining Facility served more than 730,000 meals to men, women and children.

Marian Residence Transitional Living for Senior Women provided transitional housing, daily meals and individualized support to senior women 60 and older currently in crisis.

Meals on Wheels/Senior Nutrition delivered 413,142 meals to homebound seniors and increased route efficiency to add more than 200 new clients.

Migration and Refugee Services Program (MRS) welcomed 1036 refugees over the year, including more than 177 families. MRS employment personnel secured 482 jobs for our refugee population, and provided English as a Second Language classes for 656 new registrants, with over 91,675 contact hours in our learning laboratory.

The Residential Services Division sheltered 87,689 men overnight during the year, served another 25,914 persons in our daytime summer shelter, and averaged 275 men monthly in our Resident Work Program.

Our 12 Respite Care and Supportive Services professionals relieved more than 40 primary care givers of frail homebound seniors with 10,107 hours of assistance.

Retired & Senior Volunteer Program facilitated 116,501 hours of community service provided by more than 750 senior volunteers.

St. Vincent HELP Apartments provided 120 transitional apartments to accommodate men and women, handicapped and seniors.

Senior Companion Program joined 121 Senior Companions who shared 86,508 hours with homebound senior clients.

The Senior Community Service Employment Program aided 12 senior adults, age 55 and older, to re-enter the workforce and another 19 homeless seniors to obtain housing with wages earned from their employment.

Social Services provided over 28,000 bags of food and over \$180,600 in rent/utility assistance for the year, serving more than 21,300 client families. We provided an additional 17,000 client referrals to other community providers.

Telephone Reassurance Program volunteers placed 26,889 phone calls to check in and assist homebound senior clients.

Women, Infants, and Children Program (WIC) served well over 6,400 families monthly at our three area offices, providing wellness checks along with supplemental food and nutrition education.
